It is with deep sadness that we announce the passing of Sally Gill-Thompson. She died on Saturday, October 19th, 2024, after a courageous battle with cancer.



Dr Ayise Karadag, PhD, MSN, ET/WOC Nurse, FAAN

WCET[°] extends its heartfelt congratulations to long time WCET[°] member, Dr Ayise Karadag, upon her induction as a Fellow in the American Academy of Nursing (FAAN) on Saturday, November 2nd, 2024 in Washington DC, USA.

Dr Karadag is professor of nursing at Koc University School of Nursing, which under her leadership, became the first internationally accredited BSN program in Turkey. Her research focuses on wound and ostomy care and in developing nursing capacity equipped with the knowledge, skills and competence to provide wound and ostomy care. As a pioneer in WOC nursing, her crucial role, through policy change in training and practice, has been achieved by collaboration with the Ministry of Health and national healthcare/ academic organisations. She has been instrumental in creating stoma therapy units in hospitals and wound management courses for all healthcare professionals.

She has been widely published in national and international journals and books, including more than 150 publications in international scientific journals, more than 30 national journals (Turkey), and almost 30 books or book chapters. Her work has been cited widely by the global scholar community. Dr Karadag holds BSN, MSN, and PhD degrees from Hacettepe University, School of Nursing, Ankara, Turkey and WOCN[°] certificate from the Cleveland Clinic the USA.

Being selected to become a FAAN is a rigorous process. It requires completion of an extensive application form by the candidate as well as two sponsors who are already members of the academy who know and can attest to the candidate's contributions and work. All applications are reviewed by the Academy's fellow selection committee. As reported at the induction ceremony, a little under 50% of applicants were successful in being invited to become Fellows this year. This is a special year for the American Academy of Nursing (AAN) as it celebrates its 50th year. As stated in the induction programs: "The Academy has worked to not only envision a more equitable future, but also to enact policies that ultimately create a healthier world. This is the core pillar of the Academy's mission to improve health and achieve health equity by impacting policy through nursing leadership, innovation, and science."

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Reflections on a remarkable event: WCET[®] and ASCN-UK 2024 Joint Congress unwrapping a fantastic memory package

The WCET^{*} and ASCN-UK 2024 Joint Congress, held from September 28th to October 1st in Glasgow, was an extraordinary and transformative scientific event. The Congress consisted in an impressive array of speakers, networking sessions, and workshops, providing a wealth of knowledge and inspiration. My participation expanded my understanding of best practices, cuttingedge evidence, innovations, and practical successes in the field of stoma therapy. These insights have nurtured my passion for improving care and support for people living with ostomies and fistulas. It was an honor and privilege to engage with esteemed professionals whose expertise and dedication profoundly influenced me.

Flying into Scotland, I was welcomed by its rich green landscapes and the warmth of its people, an experience that evoked vivid memories of my visit three decades ago. At that time, I was a young nurse managing a 65-bed surgical in-patient unit, participating in an educational exchange with healthcare organisations in Scotland. Since then, my professional journey has evolved from my initial love for surgery to my lifelong commitment to palliative care. For the past 22 years, I have worked at HOSPICE Casa Speranței, a recognised Center of Excellence in Palliative Care in Central and Eastern Europe.¹ HOSPICE Casa Speranței integrates a wide range of services for adults and children, including a stoma therapy clinic that provides free specialised care for ostomates of all ages from the region.

The Opening Ceremony and Parade of Nations on September 28th was a truly unforgettable experience. The sight of delegates from nearly 70 countries proudly wearing their traditional attire and waving their flags on stage was both inspiring and moving, highlighting the global reach and unity of this community.

Highlights of inspiring session

The Congress offered an impressive selection of plenaries and parallel sessions. Among the most inspiring was the presentation by Gill Castle and Claire Ryan, titled *Chameleon Buddies*. Gill's extraordinary journey, to become the first Ostomate to swim the English Channel solo, was a testament to resilience and determination. The session also highlighted the positive ripple effects of her work, which continues to inspire and support others facing similar challenges.

Equally compelling was the plenary by KeryIn Carville, who delivered a rich historical perspective while projecting a forward-looking vision for stomatherapy. Her presentation underscored the value of understanding the past to shape the future—a sentiment echoed by Romanian historian Nicolae lorga's words, "A people who do not know their history are like a child who does not know their parents."

Another standout presentation was by Christine Norton, addressing the neglected topic of faecal incontinence in Inflammatory Bowel Disease. Her session emphasised the importance of thorough assessments, empathetic communication, and access to specialised services.

I was particularly impressed by Dr Calum Lyon's session on *Experiences from a multidisciplinary dermatology clinic.* His work demonstrated the importance of interdisciplinary collaboration and innovative approaches to managing skin conditions in ostomy patients. His courage to explore new treatment avenues and his commitment to improving patients' quality of life were truly inspiring.

A number of other parallel sessions grabed my attention in how important it is to very well define the problem and its etiology so you can find the right solutions and timing to implement them. *Irritant Contact Dermatitis Due To Incontinence* presented by Dr Elizabeth A. Ayello and *Defining The High Output Stoma* presented by Michelle Carr and Paris Purnell, to name just few.

Transformative Interventions and Global Perspectives

Several sessions highlighted life-saving interventions and creative problem-solving in resource-limited settings. For example:

Dr M. Amoah's presentation *Ingestion of corrosive chemicals in Ghana Paediatrics* highlighted the severe risks children face due to improper chemical handling. It showcased the ingenuity and resilience of medical professionals who navigate these emergencies with minimal resources and exceptional creativity. I was particularly struck by the unintended consequences of a program designed to empower women through soapmaking, which inadvertently exposed their children to life-threatening hazards.

Chabo Lelaka's session, *Enterocutaneous Fistula Management at Princess Marina Hospital* showcased the profound impact of education and determination. Her efforts demonstrated how a well-trained stoma care nurse can make a life or death difference, for a whole country, even in challenging environments.

Key Insights and Practical Takeaways

The Congress offered numerous practical insights that will influence my clinical practice. Key takeaways included:

- The importance of preoperative preparation, tailored exercise programs, and psychological interventions to help patients regain independence.
- Strategies for treating peristomal granulomas only when symptomatic, correctly identifying prolapse types (fixed, sliding, telescoping, or pistoling stoma), innovative solutions like botulinum toxin, using GLOBIAD for classifying incontinence-associated dermatitis, and practical methods to measure stoma output without transferring to another container; cleaning varicose ulcers with low-alcohol solutions

like Peridex[®] (an antiseptic mouthwash) and using polystyrene bead pads for perineal edema relief.

 The link between physical and psychological recovery, emphasising emotional support and empowering communication.

I resonate deeply with the emotions in day-to-day work but recall Katie Capitulo's advice: "When you're not having fun, it's time to find something else." I thank God for the incredible gift of my job and the amazing team I work with.

Exhibition and Poster Sessions

The poster presentations were another highlight, offering a wide array of case studies and innovative solutions. These sparked valuable discussions and provided actionable ideas for clinical implementation.

The thoughtfully organised exhibition area showcased the latest advancements in ostomy devices. Among the highlights were:

- Devices crafted from soft, clothing-like materials for enhanced comfort.
- An impressive variety of convex baseplate pouches.
- Specialised garments and supportive wear designed to improve patients' quality of life.

I was particularly struck by the creativity and courage of the nurses, Marie Parslov and Cecilie Ammitzbøll who are working for a discreet, single-use device for ileostomates—a testament to the innovative spirit of this community.

Final Reflections

The WCET[®] and ASCN-UK 2024 Joint Congress in Glasgow was far more than a professional development opportunity. It was a powerful reminder of the transformative potential of innovation, collaboration, and shared expertise. The knowledge, inspiration, and connections gained during this event will undoubtedly guide and energise my efforts to provide compassionate, evidence-based, and patient-centered care for years to come.

As the incoming Secretary for the 11th APETNA Conference 2025 in Malaysia, this experience couldn't





This conference demonstrated the scientific research capacity of wound, ostomy and continence nursing in China, especially in Jiangsu Province. The Nanjing International Enterostomal Therapist School, which nurtures Jiangsu's enterostomal therapists, has become one of the most influential international schools in this field. Since its establishment in 2007 under the leadership of Principal Huo Xiaorong, the school has thrived through mutual learning and has successfully trained 410 international enterostomal therapists, playing an important role in advancing the development of wound, ostomy, and incontinence care both domestically and internationally, significantly contributing to the progress of nursing.

She shared her story as, not only a survivor of a perineal tear, recotvaginal fistual, sepsis, stoma surgery and subsequent post traumatic stress disorder, but as a champion for others. The participation of Brazilian nurses in the 23rd Biennial Congress of the World Council of Enterostomal Therapists[®] (WCET[®]) held in Glasgow was both significant and impactful. SOBEST[®] was represented by the President Dr Sônia Regina Pérez Evangelista Dantas and the Vice-President Prof. Sílvia Angélica Jorge, also present were Prof. Dr Vera Lucia Santos, precursor of stomatherapy in Brazil and Prof. Dr Angela Boccara, Chair of the WCET[®] Education Committee. SOBEST® Communication and marketing department role in disseminating enterostomal therapy in Brazil through digital media



The Department of Communication and Marketing (DECOM) has five stomatherapists who report to the executive board of the Brazilian Association of Stomatherapy (SOBEST[®]) and disseminate stomatherapy in an ethical and effective way throughout Brazil.

The director of DECOM and RN ETN [TISOBEST] Adriane Faresin was present at the 23rd WCET[°] World Stomatherapy joint Congress and ASCN-UK 2024 and presented in oral format the department experience report on the SOBEST[°] actions developed between 2021 and 2023 through digital media to promote stomatherapy in Brazil.

Digital media prove to be a valuable resource in disseminating scientific knowledge, assisting in the teaching-learning process and sharing information. As a result, 1249 publications were generated on the <u>sobest</u>. <u>com.br</u> website, which were published on SOBEST^{*} social networks, which have an average of 416.33 posts per year.

A significant increase in the number of new followers on Instagram (@sobest_oficial) was achieved, reaching 22,744 and an increase of 612.28% in the reach of publications in three years. During this period, the group's Facebook page (<u>https://www.facebook.com/</u> <u>SOBEST.oficial</u>) showed an increase of 66.75% in page views. On LinkedIn (<u>www.linkedin.com/company/</u> <u>sobest-oficial</u>), between 2021 and 2023 we had 2538 followers and 1249 publications were published, taking the content across the country.

The increase in the number of accesses and followers on social media used by SOBEST[®] demonstrates that the expansion of communication has been effective in Brazil. In the future we aim to intensify educational content through live social media events, podcasts, videos and courses created by the society.



UNISINOS is one of the institutions where the Specialisation Course in Stomatherapy Nursing is certified by SOBEST and WCET[®], being the only one with this certification in the state of Rio Grande do Sul. Graduates of this course enter the job market qualified to provide assistance to users who need assistance in specialised services in Porto Alegre and other cities in the state. The performance of our graduates in Health Services is important in the care of people with stoma, incontinence and skin lesions.

This year UNISINOS is completing the training of students in the XI class. In October this year, the practical activities took place at Hospital Conceição.

Jiangsu Province Wound Ostomy Continence Case Reports (English) Seminar ended successfully

On the afternoon of September 9th, 2024, Jiangsu Nursing Association Wound, Ostomy, Continence Committee successfully held a Nursing Case Reports (English) Seminar at Nanjing Gaoloumen Hotel, drawing a successful end to this four months of preparation.

The activity has been in full swing since June of this year. The scope of case collection includes wounds, ostomy, continence and lymphedema nursing cases. After strict screening, 12 great cases stood out and we had the opportunity to report and display them among the 46 English carefully-produced nursing case videos for the whole province.

The event was hosted by Ms Xue Hui from Jiangsu Cancer Hospital, and was reviewed by a number of internationally renowned wound ostomy nursing experts, including Professor Vicki Patton from Curtin University and Royal Perth Hospital in Australia, Professor Takashi En from Nagano Nursing University in Japan, as well as Weng Yajuan, the outgoing Chairman of the WCET[°] Education Committee and the Director of Jiangsu Province Wound, Ostomy, Continence Professional Committee, chief expert Wu Ling. The four vice-directors are Yang Lifang, Zhao Jing, Li Jingru, Zhu Shoulin.

Twelve case presenters came from 11 hospitals in Jiangsu Province respectively. They vividly explained the treatment concepts, strategies and remarkable results of their respective cases in fluent English, covering multiple frontier areas, such as complex neonatal ostomy treatment, management of malignant wounds, integrated mind-body treatment for urinary incontinence, and multi-center combined treatment of wounds complicated with lymphedema. Dr Vicki Patton, Qiao Yan, Weng Yajuan, Wu Ling and other experts not only highly praised the professional performance of the presenters, but also put forward valuable suggestions on the highlights and shortcomings in the cases, and constantly promoted the growth and promotion of professional nursing staff.



Case presentation

This exhibition activity had a variety of forms, including personal statements, team-worked defenses, and onsite interactive questions, presenting a professional knowledge feast on wound, ostomy, continence for the audience and students. The excellent skills and professionalism of the Jiangsu nursing team have won high recognition and praise from international experts in Australia and Japan. The NNA-Kenya president emphasised the need for NNA-KChapters to foster global collaborations to ensure they keep an update on their area of specialisation with evidence-based practice in the dynamic profession of nursing.

MoiTeaching & Referral Hospital members of the Wound Continence and Enterostomal Therapy Nurses Chapter of NNA-Kenya marked their inaugural Norma N. Gill Day^{*} at the institution on June 26th 2024 at the adult surgical wards and the Shoe for Africa Children's Hospital of Moi Teaching & Referral Hospital in Eldoret Kenya. These are nurses specialised in the care of patients with chronic wounds, urine and stool incontinence challenges, as well as those with artificial surgical openings for urine and stool elimination.

The event was in honour of Norma N. Gill born in Ohio in 1920, whose contribution to enterostomal therapy is celebrated worldwide as the founder of enterostomal therapy nursing. Norma N. Gill, as an as ostomate herself, worked closely with her surgeon Dr Turnbull and started the Cleveland Ostomy Association in 1960 after developing the enterostomal therapy specialisation in the late 1950s. This involved nursing training, as well as patient education and support to manage ostomies on their own and adjust to the ostomate life after surgery.

Enterostomal therapy is the care provided to people with artificial openings surgically created onto the skin for drainage of body waste products referred as ostomies. This may be for drainage of stool or urine or both due to various indications. There are various ostomy types: ileostomy – from small intestines to the abdominal skin; colostomy – from large intestines to the abdominal skin and urostomy – from the urinary tract /ureters to the abdominal skin for urine drainage.

Some of the common indications of ostomy creation in children include congenital malformations like spinabifida and anus-rectum malformations. Infections causing perforation of the large and/or small intestines, traumatic episodes including sexual violence (rape/ sodomy), spinal cord injury, intestinal obstruction due to intussusceptions where the intestines turn inside or

fold back on itself causing swelling and blockage and may be gangrenous if left unattended unaddressed.

Ostomy creation affects patients' quality of life and this specialisation of care is not well adopted by many health workers and health facilities. A great number of health workers are uncomfortable providing ostomy care while the ostomates have difficulties adjusting afterwards. This greatly affects patients' undertaking of the daily activities of living, family roles and even work.

There is a lot of stigma associated with ostomates, as well as great economic burden to buy the ostomy supplies, like ostomy bags, skin protection supplies and diet supplements.

Wound continence and enterostomal therapy nursing is a relatively new specialisation at the hospital led by Margaret Mungai (Deputy Director Nursing/ Wound Care Nurse) as a chapter of NNA-Kenya for professional growth in the country and beyond. The wound continence and enterostomal therapy nurses and student nurses visited both adult and paediatric ostomates, patients with chronic wounds, as well as others with urinary/stool incontinence challenges. They addressed wound, continence and ostomy concerns as well as gifting them with fruits.

Further the team visited young ostomates at the Shoe for Africa Hospital for a health education and support session together with the children's parents/guardians. The interactive session enabled parents to share their stories of having an ostomate child, which is usually attributed to witchcraft and/or 'evil eyes' in the African culture. They shared the challenges experienced due to inability to carry out their day-to-day activities to take care of the ostomate children. Others shared how they had sought herbal medication for a long time without it providing any help.

The parents sought to understand the duration taken before a reversal of the ostomy is done, which was well elaborated by Andrew Maiyo the Nursing Officer in charge of the Paediatric Surgical ward, as each ostomy differs depending on the age the child is brought to the hospital, as well as the underlying condition.

The parents were taken through handling the complications they experience including blockage, prolapsed ostomies and peristomal skin excoriations by ensuring diet rich with roughage, water intake and use of peristomal skin care preparations like moisture barrier ointments and powder.

The hallmark of the event is to create awareness of ostomates' experience at the health facilities and in the communities, calling for social acceptance and support by reducing the accompanying stigma. It is a call to citizens to seek health care as soon as they have wounds, incontinence and finances; for focus on human resources for health training in the specialisation of wound continence and enterostomal therapy nursing; and for enhanced multidisciplinary care teams geared towards achieving universal health coverage in the country.

We were given permission by MTRH CEO to share our experience and we had written consent from patients and parents to use their photos for ostomy experience awareness creation/dissemination and education.

I like to dream, and dream big, especially after I completed my Wound, Ostomy, Continence Education Program in Princess Margaret Hospital, Hong Kong, in Aug – October 1995. It has been 29 years, but my memories, struggles, difficulties, many happy moments, learning experiences, not to mention my sadness at leaving my three little children aged two and seven years old, are still fresh in my mind.

Friends said to me, are you crazy? Leaving your young children behind and pursuing your ambition which you, yourself are not sure of? Well, I started thinking is it worthwhile? Is this what I want to explore and do?

After, 29 years I can proudly say that IT IS WORTHWHILE!

But somehow, since the day I graduated and became an ET I have never looked back, and not only have I looked forward but always for something new and challenging. In my opinion, being an ET is the best thing that happened in my life, regardless of whatever I have to face.

I came back to Malaysia in October, after the completion of the program, and deep in my heart and mind, I knew I was going to open my ET Clinic, no matter what. I remember Norma and Marilyn saying: "No matter what, you must start the service. It is okay to take time but you must do it." Those words haunted me till I came back in Malaysia.

What I did after that is all in the history.

The day that I will never forget is Thursday May 11th 1996. The day I proudly and officially had my own clinic, and seeing the patients that I longed to help. Dreams do come true!

The door of opportunity is always open, but we need to walk through it to see what it is on the other side! No one should, or probably no-one could, drag you through it.

I was given a small room in the out-patient surgical clinic after much self-promotion, getting support from

my Colorectal Surgeon, Professor Dr KW Chang, trying hard to convince the doctors and nursing to refer cases to me.

It is not that I was highly confident at that time, but I told myself I need to do this and prove to them I can do it, and YES, I DID IT! I knew I needed to struggle a lot, and it was not going to be easy, doing dual roles without any extra budget, or staff to assist. Basically, it is a single-handed job and I started everything with and from nothing!

As Sir Winston Churchill said, "Success is not final, failure is not fatal. It is the courage to continue that counts".

Or as Steve Jobs said: "If you are working on something exciting, that you really care about, you don't have to be pushed, the vision pulls you."

In 1996, we still used television for teaching, I got a tape for teaching and a couch for my treatment room. It is a one room clinic for both counselling and stoma care.

Even though, it was not luxurious, I am so happy and proud to have this clinic and I can say out loud, look I have my own clinic to practice my role as an ET.

Many did not have confidence in me when I told them, I am going to have my own clinic soon and some of them did say, you are dreaming, it will not come true.

I continue doing my job as a Nursing Sister in one of the busiest wards with solid tumours, gastrointestinal diseases, cardiothoracic conditions and general surgery, but my love for ETN is undescribable, I want to do more and I want to improve more, especially my clinic.

I then had an assistant who was also a trained ET, Staff Nurse Azura, trained locally in our ET program and we expanded further. I worked so hard to prove to the hospital management that we need more ETs. (Patient and husband consented for the photographs).

In conclusion, we expanded further and later I was promoted as the Chief Nursing Officer but still seeing my patients until I retired, and I now continue with my own training centre to train many more nurses to become enterostomal therapist nurses (ET nurses).

This year is our six year anniversary, and we have been given recognition by WCET[®] until 2028. We hope to continue the training and at the same time help other hospitals in Malaysia to start their own training centre for ETNEPs. I hope to do much, much more.


State-level celebration


